David Isgur, N1RSN, has been working with the Public Service Enhancement Working Group (PSEWG) on revisions to the proposed ARES Strategic Plan and is crafting an executive summary for the ARRL Board to highlight how suggested changes from the ARES field leaders are being incorporated into the plan.

David has been putting together material for the ARRL Public Relations Committee, which will be reviewing nominations for the 2018 Leonard Media Awards and will be making recommendations to the ARRL Board of Directors on potential winners of the awards (for best reporting on Amateur Radio.)

And, while 1 billion QSO records represents a significant milestone, a more important statistic may be the nearly 187 million contacts confirmed via LoTW over its 15-year history. The one billionth record was uploaded by 7X3WPL, the Sahara DX Radio Club, at 23:32 UTC for a 20-meter SSB contact with with Davide Cler, IW1DQS, that took place on December 28, 2016. Membership

December ended with 156,899 members – putting us 999 members *ahead* of year-end goal. This represents a net *loss* for 2018 of 1.36% vs. the 2.0% originally forecast (1.5% loss reforecast in October).


To ensure that year-end goal was met, an unusual amount of e-mail was sent in December and 424 members were acquired via e-mail campaigns -- the second highest month (March returned 602 members) for 2018.


The *on-time* renewal rate for December expires was 73% vs. 72% last December. The *overall* renewal rate for 2018 was 83% vs. the industry average for associations with individual memberships (not trade associations) of 78%. (2018 Membership Marketing Benchmarking Report prepared annually by Marketing General Incorporated).

Below are also two graphs that show membership (plan vs. actual). The first graph shows 2018 and the second shows the past three years (since the dues increase). Overall, we followed forecast very closely in 2016 and 2017 but had a less "steep" loss in 2018 (see the trend lines) than planned.
